# ABOLISH ICE. CLOSE THE IMMIGRATION PRISONS. DEFEND OUR DEMOCRACY FROM TYRANNY.

Twenty-two years ago, Congress created a heavily armed militia, put it under the control of the President, and aimed it at some of our country's most vulnerable residents. And at every turn—as refugees die in detention, children are ripped from their parents' arms, people are dragged from their homes and cars, protesters are beaten and imprisoned—Congress responds by increasing ICE's budget and paying for more immigration prisons, most of which are run by private companies making hundreds of millions of dollars off the imprisonment of immigrants. And Donald Trump now has co-opted ICE into his own private army. They are wearing masks and carrying weapons to kidnap people for exercising their First Amendment rights, to break up immigrant-rich communities, to silence protests, and to target Trump's political opponents.

Congress justified ICE's existence by claiming that the agency, its unconstitutional excesses, and the erosion of our civil liberties make our country safe from terrorism. They do not. ICE does not serve the American people or the best interests of our country. In this 22-year-long experiment, it has become clear that ICE is not protecting our country. It is undermining it. And it is past time for Congress to abolish ICE and put an end to immigration detention.

### What is ICE?

U.S. Immigrations and Customs Enforcement (ICE) is a law enforcement agency tasked with two broad missions: to enforce civil immigration violations in the interior of the country, and to investigate transnational crimes.<sup>2</sup> It is housed within the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), both of which were established by the Homeland Security Act of 2002, in the aftermath of the September 11, 2001 terrorist attack. DHS's primary mission was to "prevent terrorist attacks within the United States" and "reduce the vulnerability of the United States to terrorism." Moving the enforcement of civil immigration infractions—in other words, the act of

living in our country without documentation—under the umbrella of counterterrorism sent a clear message: immigrants were to be viewed and treated as a threat to our country's security.

ICE has never been required to prioritize the arrest and removal of noncitizens who have been found guilty of committing terrorism-related or violent offenses. The agency's priorities are set by the president, who maintains near-total control over ICE's direction and operations.

### What is immigration detention?

Immigrants who face removal proceedings in immigration report can be released on recognizance or bond, placed under surveillance, or detained.<sup>4</sup> While some immigrants are subject to mandatory detention by statute,<sup>5</sup> in general the arresting immigration authority has broad discretion to decide whether to release or detain, with the President having significant control over these agencies' detention policies and practices.

The United States has the world's largest immigration detention system.<sup>6</sup> Many of these facilities are located in remote areas, far from the immigrants' families and legal support.<sup>7</sup> The vast majority of detained immigrants are being held in for-profit private prisons.<sup>8</sup> CoreCivic, Inc. and GEO Group, Inc. are the two largest for-profit prison companies. Together, they manage more than half of all private prisons in the country, including immigration and non-immigration detention.<sup>9</sup> They also own prison transport and immigrant and prisoner

surveillance companies. Private prisons have contributed millions of dollars to Trump and to primarily Republican candidates for office, and they spend millions on lobbying.<sup>10</sup>

Immigration detention is supposed to be civil, not punitive. But detainees, including children, are typically held in secured prison facilities, forced to adhere to prison-like rules, and subject to solitary confinement as punishment for in-facility infractions. Children are supposed to be afforded special protections, but these protections too often fail and they are subject to conditions of severe abuse and neglect. And because these purportedly are civil detention facilities, courts give them the benefit of the doubt: if the agency in charge of the facility can claim that the restrictions serve a "rational purpose," courts will find that the conditions of confinement, however inhumane, are not punitive.<sup>11</sup>

Currently, more than 70% of the more than 58,000 people currently detained have no criminal convictions. Of the remaining 30%, most have committed only minor offenses. <sup>12</sup> These numbers will get worse. ICE and other immigration agencies are denying immigrants bond hearings, <sup>13</sup> and Trump is rapidly expanding detention facility capacity, using \$45 billion from Congress to build new facilities to house more than 100,000 immigrants per day, including children and families. <sup>14</sup>

# <u>Under Trump, ICE is enabling significant constitutional violations, undermining civil liberties, and committing human rights abuses.</u>

ICE and immigration detention have long been responsible for perpetrating a vast catalog of civil liberty violations and human rights abuses, including racial profiling, unconstitutional policing, and abusive arrests by ICE officials and 287(g) local law enforcement partners; <sup>15</sup> medical neglect, forced sterilization, sexual assault by employees and other detainees, sleep deprivation, and inhumane solitary confinement of detained immigrants; <sup>16</sup> and the forcible separation of migrant families at the border. <sup>17</sup>

Since Trump took office for the second time, ICE's abuses, and the abuses of people in immigration detention, have taken an even more dangerous turn. From its local law enforcement deputies to its agents to its highest ranking officers, the agency's employees have proven willing to trample on the rights of migrants and citizens to meet Trump's demands. For months, ICE agents have been carrying out

workplace raids, 18 setting up checkpoints, 19 roaming U.S. streets, 20 and stalking courthouses, immigration offices, and once-protected areas at the heart of immigrant-rich communities.<sup>21</sup> Trump also is using ICE to serve other elements of his political agenda—specifically his campaigns to silence and punish critics, to disrupt and oppress Black and Latino communities, and to weaponize the federal government against any person or community that opposes him. He is unleashing massive ICE assaults on cities with sanctuary policies and leaders who oppose Trump, including Chicago, Boston, Washington, D.C., and Los Angeles.<sup>22</sup> He used peaceful protests against ICE incursions into Los Angeles communities as an excuse to deploy military force to the city.<sup>23</sup> He seeded ICE agents into his military takeover of Washington, D.C., with ICE swiftly taking active roles in the occupation.<sup>24</sup> And he is abusing the power of ICE to carry out targeted attacks on people whose speech or political positions he disfavors, including by stripping visas from, kidnapping, and imprisoning students and academics who have spoken in support of Palestine, including Mohsen Mahdawi, Rümeysa Öztürk, and Mahmoud Khalil.<sup>25</sup>

ICE has assisted Trump to evade court oversight, violate the Constitution, and skirt legal constraints. ICE officials, directly, in coordination with other government agencies, or through contractors, have:

- Participated in a scheme to abruptly remove hundreds of Guatemalan children asylum-seekers from Office of Refugee Resettlement facilities and fly them to Guatemala without notice over a holiday weekend to evade immigration advocate interference or court oversight.<sup>26</sup>
- Kidnapped lawfully present visa-holders, moved them to multiple locations to obscure their location, and placed them in detention thousands of miles from their families and attorneys to evade habeas proceedings and limit their access to sufficient legal assistance.<sup>27</sup>
- Flew hundreds of migrants to El Salvador for imprisonment in a maximum security facility known for human right abuses.<sup>28</sup>
- Moved hundreds or thousands of migrants through multiple facilities and onto planes to be flown out of the country, often without providing sufficient due process to the removed migrants.<sup>29</sup>

- Disappeared hundreds of men from "Alligator Alcatraz," who remain missing a month after they were to have left the facility. 30
- Engaged in violence against protesters and arrestees.<sup>31</sup>
- Orchestrated and controlled the confinement of migrants—including children—in inhumane, crowded, and abusive conditions.<sup>32</sup>
- Orchestrated end-runs around normal removal procedures by dismissing active immigration cases, then arresting, detaining, and moving the immigrant in order to deprive them of due process and attorney access.<sup>33</sup>
- Sent roving patrols into California neighborhoods to detain people solely on the basis of their apparent race and ethnicity; for speaking Spanish or English with an accent; for their presence in Latino-heavy neighborhoods; or their employment.<sup>34</sup>

Under Trump's command, ICE operates in the shadows, shielded from accountability. Arrests, raids, and city sweeps are being carried out by plainclothes, masked ICE agents without identification.<sup>35</sup> ICE attorneys are also refusing to identify themselves in court, and courts are allowing it, protecting ICE attorneys'

anonymity even as these attorneys aggressively push for the deportation of the migrants they oppose, and even as those migrants and their attorneys are required to identify themselves on record. $^{36}$ 

Citizens have never been immune to ICE's overreach,<sup>37</sup> and under Trump they face new risks of being swept up in ICE's racially discriminatory, mass-arrest approach to immigration policing.<sup>38</sup> Citizens have been arrested in raids, including in their own homes.<sup>39</sup> Members of Native nations have been interrogated and detained by ICE, deprived of opportunities to contact family members, and questioned about their tribal identification cards.<sup>40</sup> ICE has subjected civilian protesters to detention, seemingly in retaliation for their constitutional protesting activities, some of whom are being subject to baseless criminal charges either for exercising their First Amendment rights, or for simply being an unwitting bystander to anti-ICE protests.<sup>41</sup> And ICE has deported minor citizen children, including a 4-year-old boy with stage 4 kidney cancer.<sup>42</sup>

Victims of ICE's raids and arrests are being funneled into detention facilities, often after being repeatedly moved through multiple facilities and ending up far

from home, families, and attorneys.<sup>43</sup> Conditions of confinement are poor and abusive, particularly given the speed at which private and federal facilities are ramping up capacity.<sup>44</sup> Immigrants have been subject to inhumane conditions of confinement by ICE during every administration, but it is now by design. As it was in Trump's first administration, inhumane conditions of immigrant confinement, including children, is a featured element of Trump's anti-immigrant agenda.<sup>45</sup>

Trump has exploited ICE and our country's system of immigration detention because both are inherently vulnerable to exploitation. They have become featured players in his bid to quash civil rights, silence his opponents, and undermine the Constitution because the agency and the system are built to serve these anti-American agendas. They should be abolished.

## Does ICE and immigration detention make our country safer?

No. In the first 10 years after September 11, although removals of immigrants had increased significantly, the removal of terrorists, serious criminals, and national security threats *declined*. Deportations were up, but only of immigrants responsible solely for civil infractions (being in the country without documentation) or minor infractions (like traffic violations). The pattern continues through Trump's second term. Though Trump and his senior officials repeatedly claim that they are targeting "violent criminals," they are not. Between October 2024 and June 2025, 65% of ICE arrests were of individuals with no criminal convictions; more than 93% of ICE arrests were of individuals without any violent offense conviction. In fact, ICE has cut back on fugitive operations—the pursuit of undocumented individuals accused of serious crimes who have fled law enforcement—in favor of mass arrests at workplaces, community meeting places, even immigration offices.

The strategy of mass arrest, imprisonment, and removal of immigrants who have only committed civil immigration offenses or minor criminal infraction also has undermined the security and stability of communities across the country, in which immigrants, documented and undocumented, play vitally important roles. It also has led to widespread civil rights violations of citizens and documented immigrants, from the harassment of indigenous Americans to the deportation of American children, from the arrest of ICE protesters to the stripping of visas and kidnapping of outspoken students.

Any system that places an army of unchecked power in the hands of the executive, with broad authority to set its policies to serve his own agenda, is vulnerable to anti-democratic abuse. Moreover, any system that defines entire communities, ethnicities, and cultures as the enemy is antithetical to the functioning of a democracy. The encroachment on our rights will not stop at immigrants, their families, or their neighborhoods. But even if it did, ICE would still represent a serious threat to our democratic ideals, values, and institutions.

# Do we need ICE and immigration detention?

No. Experts in the field have long proposed alternatives to an enforcementand detention-centric approach to immigration.<sup>49</sup> This includes shifting to a process that prioritizes compliance instead of punishment. ICE is only 22 years old; and immigration detention, while older than that, has a shameful past and only began to accelerate in the mid-1990s. The United States has long grappled with the complex questions of immigration without relying on an agency and institution that fundamentally is at odds with our democratic values.

#### Conclusion

ICE's structure and mission, which places total control in the hands of the executive branch and presumes that the enforcement of civil immigration policies is part of the United States' counter-terrorism mandate, is ripe for abuse. And abuse is precisely what we have seen under the second Trump administration. ICE has

turned itself and its bloated budget over to Trump, who is treating ICE as a private army whose enemies are Trump's enemies, from immigrant-rich communities to political dissidents. Detention—long rife with human rights and civil liberty abuses—has become a weapon in Trump's arsenal, a means of visiting harsh punishments on thousands of people for existing in this country, for speaking against Trump's policies, for living in communities that oppose Trump's policies. Both the agency and the system of detention undermine the United States' security agenda and democratic values.

Free Speech For People therefore endorses the abolishment of the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) and calls for the end of immigration imprisonment.
